DOING NOTHING



In February Australia passed a <u>"right to disconnect"</u> law that prohibits employers from contacting workers after hours, with penalties including possible jail time for bosses who do not cooperate. The law

comes into effect later this year.

Certain jobs of course are exempt, but under the law, employees will be able to make complaints with their employer about afterhours phone calls or the expectation that they answer emails outside of their working hours.

I appland this! Everyone deserves a right to disconnect; to switch off from the pressures and demands of work and life.

We're entering what is for some a holiday period, an opportunity to escape to the sun or to whatever climate, culture or adventure floats your boat. You might know that the word 'holiday' derives from the old English word Haligdaeg which means 'holy day'. One translation of 'holy' is 'set apart'. So, these are days set apart to step off the treadmill of life and make time for relaxation and self-care.

Sometimes doing 'nothing' is the best thing we can do. The perfectionist and workaholic within us of course does its darndest to make us feel guilty when we stop. Doing 'nothing' however is always doing something. It's a resting, a refreshing, it's a refueling. In many religious traditions there's an invitation to retreat. These are times set aside to retreat from our usual rhythms to invest in reconnecting with God.

Holy-days are essential, whether we spend them on beaches, in back gardens or with a religious community. So, take time this summer to switch off. Be kind to yourself. Have permission to do absolutely 'nothing', because we all have the 'right to disconnect'.







ALAN'S REPORT TO THE MEETING

PERFECTLY IMPERFECT

GIVING THANKS FOR ALL THAT CHRIST HAS ACHIEVED IN AND THROUGH US AND WHERE

HE MAY BE CALLING US AS A CHURCH:



As beautiful, and cared for and historic as the building we know as St Andrew's Church is, this building of course is not the Church. And

as familiar and comforting and inspiring perhaps as the liturgy, tradition and music might be, this also is not the Church. Take them away, and we still have the Church. Why? Because **we** are the Church; you and I members of a community of ordinary, beautiful and broken people with the purpose of living out our call to be Christ's presence where we are.

The American theologian John Howard Yoder unpacks something of that call:

'The church seeks to help form people who can risk being peaceful in a violent world, risk being kind in a competitive world, risk being faithful in an age of cynicism, risk being gentle among those who admire the tough, risk love when it may not be returned, because we have the confidence that in Christ, we have been reborn into a new reality.'

Peaceful, kind, faithful, gentle, loving. This is our calling. And we all know that however hard we try; at times we fall short. As the saying goes; 'If you find a perfect church, be sure not to join it'. Because obviously if you do, it will no longer be a perfect church.

So here we are, perfectly imperfect. And we gather today to reflect on this past year together, to give thanks for all that Christ has achieved in us and through us, and to explore a little where He may be calling us next.

Fresh in the memory of many of us will be our recent joint Parish Away Day with our sister church of St Mary's. Our theme this year was 'Wholehearted' living, defined by Brene Brown as 'Engaging with our lives from a place of worthiness... cultivating the courage, compassion and connection to wake up in the morning and think, 'No matter what gets done and how much is left undone, I am enough.'

It was so special to have so many of us, of so many different ages gather to worship, explore and connect. Our thanks in particular go to St Joseph's in the Park School who offered such wonderful hospitality, not to mention delicious food.

If you haven't tried an Away Day, you really are missing something very special.

Our work within the three schools including St Joseph's, Hertingfordbury Cowper and our own Hertford St Andrew, continues with whole-school weekly collective worship (or assemblies) on Tuesdays and with Early Years on Wednesday mornings (one of the absolute highlights of my week). I'm indebted yet again to Tracy Plumpton who continues to work alongside me. I'm delighted to say that members of the congregation support our church school through the Walking Bus and through serving as governors, and that recently we've started a prayer meeting at the school for parents, staff and governors.

Last year we trialed Forest Church in the Forest School area at St Joe's. We weren't sure, however, if it was quite the right format and location, so we took the decision to suspend that for the time being as we pray about other expressions of outdoor church, the first of which was A Soulful Walk on Palm Sunday in Panshanger. So, watch this space.

We continue to be indebted to our wonderful team who so faithfully work with our children and young people supporting TMM, Junior Church and Toddlers. It was great fun to be with the TMMers last Sunday when I joined them for a session of games, grill-the-vicar, and a talk from the vicar about Confirmation. Already several of the young people have expressed an interest in joining the Exploring Confirmation sessions in May and we look forward to hosting a

Confirmation service here on Tuesday 4th June with the former Bishop of the Falkland Islands no less! If you're interested in joining those sessions, whatever your age, you'd be more than welcome without any obligation whatsoever.

As you'll know, for the last year and a half, we've been advertising for a new Children and Families Worker with no success. It's now time to crank up the prayer for this and for the team who are so brilliantly holding the fort. We've set aside Saturday 4th May as a Day of Prayer. We'll start at 8.30am with Breathe (online and in person in the chapel), then continue to pray privately throughout the day, and end with a time of committing to pray together wherever we might be at 6pm. For Junior Church in particular, we need to pray for new leaders, so please speak with me or with Claire Wacher if you think that's something God might be nudging you about.

You'll have noticed no doubt that our parish continues to grow, not least with the new housing development Blakemore Manor off Thieves Lane and Welwyn Road. This year Kath Oates and Stephane McCarthy have been welcoming the new residents with a card and a gift of some biscuits, and have been having some wonderful conversations. One of the things that came up a lot was how fortunate we are to have Panshanger Park on our doorstep, so we're beginning to explore how we might create opportunities for people there to connect with one another and with something greater in that particular Great Outdoors.

It was wonderful to have our first New Year's Walk there ending with a welcome beverage at the Golden Griffin.

Our fortnightly Mindfulness sessions at the Hub on Sele seem to be going from strength to strength and are building a lovely and supportive community. Our Wednesday evening Mindfulness and Meditation continues to be popular. I love leading these sessions but it's a big time commitment, so starting in June, it will run fortnightly rather than weekly, with every other session being hybrid both in church and online. That said, I'm afraid I'm on holiday in June so there will just be one session on Wednesday 5th.

This year in the Brace Room at St Mary's, we held an eight-week Bible Course which was hugely valued by those who came. We'll be repeating this course starting Thursday 6th June. Please speak with Kath Oates or Melanie Seward if you're interested. In October, there will be a follow-up course on the book of Romans.

Within the last year we've hosted lots of different events and services which have brought many new people through our doors including the monthly coffee mornings, HarvestFest, Beer and Carols, the all-new Mindful Christmas, the Railway Day and the ever-popular folk concerts. We're indebted to Chris Seward and his team for securing such high-profile folk and helping to bring in this valuable revenue stream which will help us future-proof the life of this church building. As you've already heard we look forward soon to improving the Audio Visuals within the church both to help with

this and to enhance our worship and outreach.

On the subject of technology, we continue to be very grateful to the Zoom team who enable folk from far and wide to connect with others and with God each Sunday.

My huge thanks go to all the groups and teams that sustain the ministry, hospitality and mission of this church including the Choir, our musicians, our Vergers and Servers, our gardeners, the Flower team, the Coffee teams, bellringers, the youth and children's teams, Toddlers, Pastoral visitors and all the committees; the Finance Committee who help us balance the books, the Eco Committee helping us with the Church of England goal of becoming carbon-neutral by 2030 and our Communications Team who are doing such a great job of promoting the work of the church and are currently working on a Welcome Pack for newcomers.

One new team created this year is the Prayer Ministry Team, and I'd encourage you to make use of that opportunity to pray with a trusted other, both within and after the 10.30am service.

This year it's been wonderful to add several new people to the Ministry Team, Adrian Walter and Nick Hoyle as Lay Leaders of Worship and Maria Henrikson-Bell taking on the added hat of Pioneer Leader and doing some wonderful connecting particularly with the Home Education community. Our particular thanks as always goes to Rev Bill Church who continues to exercise his wonderful ministry among us.

In particular, I'd like to say one enormous thank you to Phil Probert our parish administrator, who's professionalism, kindness and creativity is an invaluable asset to our church. Thanks also go to Carol Muhr, who is not only our PCC secretary but also steps up to help when Phil is away.

Some of you will have heard that Hertford is holding its first ever Pride Family Fun Day on Sunday 12th May, celebrating diversity and inclusion. With the backing of our wardens and ministry team, we will offer our chapel that day as a safe place of prayer and reflection.

You will perhaps be aware that the Church of England has authorised new prayers of blessing for those in same-sex couples entitled Prayers of Love and Faith.

In the pastoral guidance the C of E writes, 'The Prayers of Love and Faith make provision for stable, faithful relationships between same-sex couples and for giving thanks for their faithfulness and their fruitfulness in service to God and neighbour. In that sense, they recognize the couple's commitments to one another. They ask for God's grace in the holy ordering of companionship and godly love as they follow Christ and seek to grow in holiness. They ask for God's blessing for them and their families as they offer self-giving love to one another, and in their witness and service to their neighbours'.

The pastoral guidelines state that it's up to the individual priest as to whether they are happy in conscience to offer these prayers. It will perhaps come as no surprise to you that I am fully supportive.

It will be important however to consult with the PCC and with the wider congregation. If you have anything you'd like to contribute to that conversation, do please talk to me. [Please see the update below.]

I'd like to end by saying how grateful I am to be your priest, and how thankful I am for your support and your care. Thank you to each one of you for all that are and all that you bring to the life and worship of this perfectly imperfect church we call Hertford St Andrew's.

Prayers of Love and Faith

The <u>Prayers of Love and Faith</u> are a collection of prayers of blessing for same-sex couples who love one another and who wish to give thanks for and mark that love before God.

On 12th December last year, the House of Bishops commended the Prayers of Love and Faith for use in regular public worship services.

At our May PCC meeting, I'm delighted to say that the PCC voted unanimously to use these prayers. At present, this can only happen within an existing service, but a time may come when we can consider stand-alone services. 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ECO-CHURCH

We all need a good news story so here's a newsflash, just in:

St Andrew's gains award for Eco-Church work

As many of you know, St Andrew's has been working hard towards achieving Church of England status as a parish recognised for its eco-friendly mission and values. This is not optional – like all Church of England churches (and those of many other denominations) nationwide, we are obliged to 'safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew life on Earth' by meeting eco-church standards under a scheme monitored by a Church-linked charity called A-Rocha.

There are three levels of recognition under the A-Rocha scheme – bronze, silver and gold – and we have recently been

presented with the first-level award: we have achieved the bronze standard, and a plaque of recognition is on its way!



Achieving bronze has been due mainly (as examples) to:

- Understanding more about how we use our energy resources;
- Holding events such as coffee mornings that reflect our eco-church mission;
- Articles in the parish magazine and website about our eco work;
- Workshops about environmental schemes such as the one at Parish Awayday;
- Better use of Fairtrade and local products;

- Our effort to recycle and the use of rain butts.

So far so good, but there's more to do!

Our Bronze Award has been achieved through a collaborative effort within our congregation and is well deserved. But we can't sit on our laurels or our recycling bins. There is a long way to go to meet the next level of award, and the one after that. The diocese is encouraging us to go for Gold.

With this in mind, the PCC held a special meeting on the 18th May to discuss the next steps and I'm pleased to say that the ideas were plentiful. Watch out for an increase in environmentally-friendly measures appearing across a range of our work, including:

- Rethinking our energy arrangements for the church, St Andrew's Centre and other parish property;
- Increasing our recycling capacity;
- More publicity of what we are doing, including an eco-church information area in the church, with short, medium and long-term plans with a place for you to share your ideas;
- Building environmental prayers and study into all worship.

The PCC recognised that these measures are not optional – they are obligatory under the guidelines of the Church of England and the Archbishop of Canterbury. Like Noah's family, we all have to get on board with the eco movement and do what we can to protect the environment.

I think you'll agree, God's world and life on this planet is worth saving!

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


A TALE OF TWO EASTERS

ADRIAN WALTER THROWS SOME LIGHT ON THE SUBJECT

If you were at church on Sunday 5th May you would have had the opportunity to taste some delicious Kozunak, a Bulgarian Easter cake baked for us by our friend Rifka.

Afterwards I was approached by a number of people asking why there were two Easters in the Christian tradition. The answer is, that it's mainly to do with calendars.



However the synod did not set a date. That was done by Constantine, the Roman Emperor of the time who decreed that it would be celebrated throughout the world on the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox. If this full moon occurs on Sunday, then it will be celebrated on the following Sunday so that Easter would never coincide with the Jewish Passover. This was also convenient as most of the known world had pagan festivals at this time which the church attempted to "Christianise". The very word Easter is derived from the Saxon word Eostre, a spring pagan festival. It will come as no surprise that here in Britain we used a completely different calculation to the rest of the world, devised by the Venerable Bede, until the Synod of Whitby in 664 agreed to adopt the Roman calendar.



However, the problem was that the calendar in use at the time was the Julian calendar, established by Julius Caesar in 45 B.C. and based on the solar cycle i.e. earth's revolutions around the sun. The problem with the Julian calendar was that there was an annual 11 minute miscalculation that, over the years, caused the actual seasons to become out

of sync with the calendar. This pushed Easter away from the spring equinox so, in 1582, Pope Gregory XIII instituted the Gregorian calendar, adding leap years, to correct these inaccuracies in the Julian Calendar. The new calendar "fixed" Easter to the first Sunday after the full moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox.

Although the world came to officially recognise the Gregorian calendar the Orthodox churches, primarily in Greece, Cyprus, Russia, Romania and Bulgaria continue to observe Easter according to the Julian calendar and many only adopted the Gregorian calendar as their secular calendar as late as the 20th century!

The consequence of this is that the earliest Western Easter can be is March 22^{nd} and that has only happened twice, in 1761 and 1818. It will not happen again until 2285 and 2353. The latest it can be is April 25^{th} which last happened in 2011 and will not happen again until 2038. It is more common for Eastern and Western Easters to coincide, such as in 2017 and next year (2025). However, due to the errors in the Julian calendar continuing to move the dates of the Orthodox Easter, 2698 will be the last time the two Easters ever coincide.

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LATIN LINK & ANGEL TREE CENTRE

Jenny Aitken brings us a further update from Julie Noble in Oruro, Bolivia on life in the country and her work at the Angel Tree Centre.

Julie Noble is part of the Latin Link American mission. Latin Link is an international community with a calling to love and serve God and our neighbour. Most members of Latin Link work in Latin American countries while some work with Latin Americans in other parts of the world. Angel Tree Centre works with prisoners' children and families.

Julie writes 'It should be Day of the Sea today but events to remember the 145th anniversary of the loss of the sea to Chile in the Pacific War had to be brought forward because Saturday 23rd March was designated as census day. The last census was held in November 2012.

Across Bolivia the Population and Housing Census is being carried out by 845,000 volunteers visiting 5.8 million homes to fill in a questionnaire. To carry out the census efficiently, an auto de buen gobierno was put into place banning movement from midnight on Friday until midnight on Saturday. Everybody, except the press and those conducting the census must stay at home. It is forbidden to carry guns, sell or drink alcohol and use public or private

transport.

International borders are closed for the day.

Schools and workplaces were shut down on Friday afternoon and there were ridiculous queues of people stocking up food for the shut-in. People who have emigrated from rural areas to the cities were reminded by the Rural Workers Union of a moral obligation to return to their communities and many did but the National Office of Statistics encouraged them to remain in the place where they access health and education services so that the census results would not be distorted.

The children came to Angel Tree on Friday morning and the Bible study ladies managed to have their class in the afternoon.

The lady assigned to complete the census in the block of flats where I live knocked on my door at 8.30am. Together we filled in the 59 questions on the form. There were a lot of questions about housing and utilities, a question about whether anyone in the family had emigrated, a question about health provision and whether anyone in the household had died since questions about work, identification with an indigenous people and language, but no questions about religion. The only question I could not answer was what the roof of my building was made of!'

shares news of some of their activities:

Games Night: we are thinking and praying about how we use the new £30m Hertford Theatre (BEAM) which opens at the end of August, and one idea we are investigating is to have the Friday night Gaming one week in October in either one of the three cinemas or Stage 2, the small 150-Seater Theatre. We would publicise this for 18-30s through social media and invitations through local churches and clubs; one idea is to show an extract from *The Chosen* as part of a mixed programme. Bible Study: the group has started a series on Hebrews, which is brave, and are now getting their minds round Melchizedek.





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THE AURORAE

SANDY ROBERTSON THROWS LIGHT ON THE PHENOMENON

During the week leading up to Friday 10th May, there was a huge sunspot on the sun. This was so big as to be visible to the eye when viewed with eclipse glasses. The sunspot was about 15 times the size of our earth (similar in size to the

sunspot that caused the "Carrington" event in the 19th century). The sunspot has been very active and casting much material from the sun into space. (the material is known as a "coronal mass ejection" or CME). This material took a few days to reach us here on earth and much

of it arrived on Friday 10th May. On arrival, it affected the earth's magnetic field and huge amounts of energy were released into the atmosphere causing the display of the aurorae throughout the sky. This display was probably a once in a lifetime experience. The aurorae were seen as far south as the Caribbean.

To the naked eye, here in Hertfordshire with lots of light pollution, the display was faint, and the colours could only just be made out. This is mainly because our eyes are not very good at seeing colours when it is dark. That is also the reason why



things look black and white or silver when lit by the full moon. When a photograph is taken, the camera can still "see" the colours of the display phenomena even with low light levels. The camera reveals to those looking at the picture the

glorious colours that were previously unable to be seen with our senses.

Seeing such a display of colours and light on such a huge scale and being aware of the amount of energy involved to create it really emphasised to me how small we are on this planet in the context of our solar system, not to mention the universe as a whole.

Somehow there seems to me to be a parallel here to the description in 1 Corinthians 13:12 of seeing through a glass darkly, where what we now perceive with our own senses is a limited view and does not reveal the full glory of what is actually going on.



For now we see through a glass darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part, but then I shall know even as also I am known. 1 Corinthians 13:12 King James version
