NAMING FEAR

As I write, angry mobs have been gathering in towns across the country, demonstrating outside mosques, damaging hotels housing refugees, and clashing violently with police. This was sparked, we're told, by misinformation on social media following the tragic death of three little girls in a Southport dance class; Bebe, Elsie and Alice.

Even after clarification that the killer was born and bred here in the UK and not linked to any extremist groups, the violent protests continue.

It's clear that far-right groups have been able to tap into deep-seated anger among those who feel disenfranchised and frustrated by what they see as the failure of successive governments to limit immigration.

It's clear that these root causes of anger and fear need to be addressed at government level, but the work of peace-making always begins at grassroots. What does that look like?

It looks like ordinary people turning up the morning after to clear the damage and rebuild the walls torn down as missiles. It looks like thousands gathered in vigil to blow bubbles like prayers into the sky. It looks like members of a mosque taking food to antislamic protesters and cups of tea to police officers. It looks like an imam hugging one of those protesters, crying, 'our hearts are broken too'.

This anger and fear cannot simply be addressed by legislation, prison and fines. It can only be met with understanding and compassion. And that's harder, much, much harder.

Perhaps this is a moment for us all to reflect on our own anger and prejudice; to ask for the courage not to suppress it but to own it and name it, because sometimes naming something



can diffuse its power. And then to ask ourselves if there is anything we can do to address it. Can I speak to or speak up for someone I struggle to accept, or reach out with little acts of kindness. If I pray, I can pray that the all-inclusive love of God works its miracle within us all, beginning with me.

Bike 'n Hike is the Trust's main fundraiser, raising £99,666 in 2023. This is a fantastic amount for which the Trust is most grateful, and they hope to break the £100,000 barrier in 2024.

It's a vital challenge, because while churches continue to need repairs, building costs have soared. The Trust can do it if more people are sponsored to take part in this fun day out, visiting beautiful historic churches. EXPLORING ST PAUL'S LETTER TO THE ROMANS

THE ROMANS COURSE

Tuesday evenings at St Mary's Hertingfordbury September – November 2024



A ten-session Bible Society course exploring Paul's letter to the Romans. The course is created and presented by Andrew Ollerton, who will be familiar to those who took part in the recent Bible Course. It follows a similar pattern of video presentation and discussion.

What is the Romans Course?

The Romans Course is a ten-session programme which helps you study Paul's letter to the Romans. The course tackles ten big themes found in the book of Romans which are key to understanding the Christian faith:

- Gospel How can we become confident in our faith?
- Sin What's wrong with the world?
- **Salvation** What's so amazing about grace?
- **Peace** How can we find rest in a stressful world?
- Freedom How can we avoid negative cycles?
- Hope What has God promised?
- **Mystery** If God is sovereign, what is our role?
- Devotion How can we live full on for God?
- Community How can we live together in love?
- Mission How can we be ambitious with the gospel?

After nearly two years working towards the upgrading of our audio-visual system, enough money has been raised for new sound equipment to be installed in the church during October. Nearly £50,000 so far has been raised from grant applications, church events and careful use of church funds and now the PCC has agreed to a direct appeal for the remaining £25,000.

This will pay for new screens and a projector that will be fully integrated with the audio system. The screens will include a single large screen at the front of the church which retracts nearly out of view when not in use and some small, TV-like screens to enable everyone to see clearly wherever they are sitting (see images).

GIVING MONTH

preached God's message even though they were both put in prison, and ultimately died, for doing it. For Peter and Paul, things were very different to begin with and their lives show us how we can all be changed...





Children are equal members of any church congregation. At St Andrew's, we value greatly their contribution to worship and the life of the church community and believe we can learn much from their example.

Children are never too young to come to church. You and your children are very welcome at St Andrew's. We realise that bringing children, especially babies and toddlers, to church can be challenging to say the least, so we have set aside part of the church (the Children's Corner) at the front of church (to the right of the altar) which is equipped with toys, books, craft materials and a space to call their own. Here, even if they are occupied with a toy or book, children absorb the atmosphere of worship.

Junior Church

During the 10.30am Parish Communion on Sundays in term time, there are activities for children in the St Andrew's Centre. Every Sunday except during the All-Age Service (usually the second Sunday of the month), the children will begin the service with the congregation and then, after the first hymn, they leave to join Junior Church.

All-Age Services

These are monthly, shorter, child-friendly, interactive communion services with songs and prayers which are held once a month: usually but not always on the second Sunday of the month. Children stay in church for the whole of the service.

ALAN & HIS ART

40 DAYS - an exhibition of drawings at St Mary's Hertingfordbury in July













Rev Alan had a very successful and enjoyable exhibition of his art, or more specifically his drawings, at St Mary's over a weekend in July. Friday evening was open to family, friends and the local community. Saturday was open to all with a glass of wine and canapes enjoyed as we studied the wide range of drawings. On the Sunday people could drop in to appreciate his work in the lovely tranquil setting of St Mary's.

So what is art to Alan?

Alan has always drawn pictures. When his mum owned a fish and chip shop, he'd draw endlessly on the paper she served the fish and chips in. Following a Foundation Course at Belfast Art College in 1987, it was a toss-up for Alan whether to pursue his studies in fine art or fashion. He chose fashion thinking it would provide better employment prospects and went to study Fashion and Textiles at Central St Martin's College of Art in London. His career may have moved from fashion to the priesthood but he has continued to draw and paint. He has exhibited his work at the London School of Theology and St Saviour's Church in Knightsbridge as well as St Mary's Hertingfordbury! He works in most media but enjoys charcoal, pastel and ink the best and has now transformed one of the rooms at the Rectory into a studio.

During the exhibition Alan sold over forty pieces and several prints which consisted of charcoal drawings of animals, abstract pieces and a few semi-abstract portraits and landscapes.

But why 40 Days? "During Lent this year, I set myself the goal of creating a drawing every day, hence the title of the exhibition '40 Days'. I wanted to loosen up my style of drawing which had become tight and controlled and to experiment with abstract art. However, I often return to Biblical themes. Something comes alive in me when I make art" explained Alan. Thank you and God bless Alan

UNLOCKING FREEDOM

Slavery is something we read about in the Bible (the Israelites in Egypt, for example) or learn about at school when we study Victorian history. Slavery belongs to the past. Or does it? In a lunchtime presentation at St Andrew's last month, Ashleigh Gibb explained the reality of slavery in the 21st century and told us about the work of a London-based charity called Ella's. Forbes Mutch reports.



It's hard to imagine, but an estimated 50 million people around the world today are trapped in modern slavery, often in a form known as 'human trafficking'. This is when victims have been forced to leave home and manipulated into working for the profit of others, usually in abusive situations involving the use of violence, threats or coercion. Modern slaves are held captive for purposes such as forced prostitution, servitude, labour, crime or forced marriage. Nearly 80% of people trafficked today are women and children; over six million are being exploited in the sex trade worldwide.

One in every five women in the UK will experience violence during their lifetime. Globally, this number rises to one in four. In 2023, slightly more than 17,000 victims of modern slavery were referred to the UK authorities.

The effect of slavery on women is devastating. They face multiple barriers to recovery and long-term safety and, without the right support, survivors are

extremely vulnerable to the prospect of falling backwards into the danger they have left.

Ashleigh explains that this is where charities such as London-based *Ella's* can help. She has been working as a Survivor Development and Community Coordinator at Ella's since returning to the UK last January after a period of research and study in California. During her illustrated talk at St Andrew's, she says that *Ella's* exists to address the dangerous gap in the official care system and provide survivors of trafficking and exploitation with a real chance to recover and stay free.

The charity was launched in 2014 by Emily Chalke and was named after a victim of trafficking called Ella, who was known to Emily. Ella had been exploited since childhood, and then trafficked from her home country to Thailand and later to London. She had been trapped in the sex trade for years. *Ella's* opened its first safe house in 2016 and became an independent charity in 2020.

Ashleigh explains that the women they work with are among the most vulnerable in the UK. 'They have experienced layered abuse over time starting in childhood. As a result, their needs are complex, and they face multiple barriers to building a safe life.'

The charity now runs three safe houses and provides regular support for more than 60 women and 50 children a year in neighbourhoods across London. The ages of these women range from early 20s to late 60s. The majority are aged 26 to 35.

Ashleigh says that the charity's casework is tailored to the needs of the individual. 'We work with each woman to form a

recovery plan and work closely in collaboration with others,' she says. 'Casework support at Ella's typically includes help with medical care; emotional support, education and skills training, finding employment and accommodation, immigration and legal support, bringing abusers to justice, building confidence and life skills and helping with community integration.'

The overall goal of the charity is to make sure that survivors of trafficking and exploitation have all they need to recover and build lives that are safe and free.

Ella's can only scratch the surface of the problem facing the hundreds of victims of modern slavery in the UK today, but it makes a difference. Ashleigh has now returned to San Diego, California to

In order to make sure that our Bible Study Sessions are interesting, educational, and relevant for people who follow Jesus, we have placed a strong emphasis on discipleship this year by testing fruitful Bible Study techniques for our 18-25 age group. In a more relaxed atmosphere, our Emmaus Meal has also flourished, strengthening ties among our core group.

We want to be more proactive in our evangelism, bringing up important topics related to Hertford and reaching a wider audience online. We also intend to invest more in our game night, which is becoming more and more popular. While preserving its central game premise, we intend to go beyond gaming to create a lively social environment."

The football team led by Reiss, now called Lovin Jesus, came joint top of Division 1 in the Hertford Area Leisure League. Reiss has just completed his second year of a Sports Ministry degree at Ridley Hall, Cambridge, and has been it an interestina assignment to be his Supervisor; the Review discussions we have with Fiona Green, the Vice-Principal and Dean of Ministry Students are always fascinating and wide-ranging. At the Emmaus Meal Reiss mentions, they have been working through C S Lewis's Mere Christianity.

We would value prayer for the Weekend away 6th-9th September when about 25 are going to Sherwood Forest to do Go-Ape, and generally chill out together.

OUTREACH: THE MALAWI PROJECT

St Lawrence Church Abbots Langley has been supporting St Luke's Hospital, Malosa since 2010. Here's some of the story: "The hospital is in a small village in southern Malawi, and as well as functioning as one of the main hospitals in the area, it also boasts an impressive primary health care department, providing outreach projects and nurseries to the outlying villages.

What started as a modest contribution to the hospital (about £250 per year) has now developed into a firm and lasting relationship with St Luke's Hospital and the community of Malosa.

In 2012, along with St Luke's Church in Watford, we raised £32,000 to build a new maternity unit in one of the Hospital's outlying clinics.

Our link with Malosa, Malawi has continued to be with the St Luke's Hospital and much of our fundraising and support goes to the

hospital. However we have also established firm links with Malosa Secondary School and the Chichewa Training Centre."

Malawi remains one of the poorest countries in the world according to its GDP with an economy heavily dependent on agriculture where 80% of the







population are working at subsistence level. The unpredictability of rainfall causes crops to fail leading to famine and malnutrition. With a population of 21 million, 1.5 million have Aids/HIV. Malaria and TB are rife and there is still a high rate of infant mortality.

In addition to the maternity unit, support from Lawrence has provided a clean water supply. On the recent visit the team rebuilt the men's toilet and shower area. The team also visited the nurseries to see how the funds and resources were beina used with the children. In the school they have helped to establish training in tailoring with the use of treadle sewing machines enabling young people to gain skills and employment.

St Andrew's congregation has stepped up to the challenge of helping to support this worthy cause by donating things to be sent in a container. We have already sent a wheelchair, 5

Zimmer frames and 4 sets of crutches plus numerous bandages, incontinence pads, masks and hand sanitizer, PPE and a blood pressure monitor. The next batch to send over before the container leaves is full of colouring pencils, biros, pencil sharpeners and rubbers. We also have CONTINUED French

LATIN LINK & ANGEL TREE CENTRE

Jenny Aitken brings us an update from Julie Noble in Oruro, Bolivia on life in the country and her work at the Angel Tree Centre.

Julie Noble is part of the Latin Link American mission. Latin Link is charity registered in England and an international community with a calling to love and serve God and our neighbour. Most members of Latin Link work in Latin American countries while some work with Latin Americans in other parts of the world. 'Angel Tree Centre works with prisoners' children and families.



Julie Noble was on leave in England in May and June. She is now back in Oruro, Bolivia and working as hard as ever.

She writes, 'Since returning to Bolivia, the main event has been the pantomimic occurrence on 26th June. Around twenty people were arrested for their what, according to part in the government was an attempted coup organised by an army General. Descriptions like sham, staged, stunt, self-coup, and farce abound. Whatever the truth, no one expects it to be revealed. However, the economic situation here is deteriorating, gas exports are declining, there are fuel shortages and food costs are rising. The Presidential election is next year!

Meanwhile at the Renacer Young Offender Centre where I work, there have now been eight administrators since the beginning of the year thus little continuity. A boy escaped through the front door a couple of weeks ago so another educator was suspended.

Today there were over ninety young people detained with the latest group, *jucos* (mineral stealers) housed in the only classroom. We have just been assigned new individual cases for this semester. I have four drug cases as well

as the rape case from last semester I am still working with. We were able to hold restorative conferences in two incest cases and family group meetings with a number of the boys and their families.

The Angel Tree Centre where we care for the children of prisoners reopened on 24th July after the winter vacation. We now have several students from the German School assisting us with the children's activities. The Centre celebrated its 18th anniversary at the beginning of May and we spent time reflecting on God's faithfulness to us during this time.'

At the end of Julie's letter she sent her sincere thanks for St Andrew's support and prayers.
